Hurricane season is upon us. Please stay safe and stay prepared. There is a Hurricane Preparedness packet located in the clubhouse and a copy for you in the office if you want to come get one. It has great tips and lots of useful information in the event of a hurricane.

We are looking forward to hosting our Annual Fall Cookout. It has been planned for September 24th from 12-2. If you haven't signed up yet, please do as soon as possible. I hope to see you all there. We will be sending out our increase notice letters for our Pass Through and Fire Tax for 2026 this month; be on the lookout. As always, the pass through tax will be given as an estimate. We will get the final number in November. These are sent out so that you can do your best to plan for payment due January 1st with your monthly rent. These charges will be withdrawn automatically from your accounts if you are signed up for EFT. As a reminder, ELS will not be approving any payment plans or extensions. Both taxes are due January 1st and will be considered delinquent if not paid by the due date.

I want to share the ongoing progress of our Clubhouse Renovation. It is getting closer and closer to our start date. Once the permit is obtained, work will start on the outside first. We then will shut down the Clubhouse for the remainder of the work. I will stay in contact with updates as I receive them. We have lots of upgrade projects in the works. This will require closing of the facilities to do so. I thank you for your patience as we move through them as quickly as we can. ### **Hurricane Preparedness**

As always, it's better to be safe than sorry. Because we live in a mobile home community, hurricane winds pose a distinct threat to our homes. Although usually it is not necessary to evacuate—and most of us do not leave—many full-time residents can relate worrisome stories of rocking and shaking homes when winds become too strong. Spin-off tornadoes can also affect our area and have caused damage in the past, as can flying debris. It is difficult to know when or if to evacuate, and the choice is an individual one, but it's important to be ready to leave if you feel unsafe.

#### **How to Know:**

In the event of possible storm impact, all local television stations will offer ongoing monitoring of any dangers. You can download cell-phone weather apps for all local TV stations as well. Additionally, you can register for notifications to your cell phone and/or email at: https://alertlake.com Your neighbors and the HOA can also be of help.

#### What to Do:

Be sure to secure your yard around your home by bringing inside/tying down any furniture, plants, wind chimes, bird feeders, other items that could become flying debris. If you can, turn off your water.

#### Where to Go:

Lake County has several shelters near us, and choosing a motel/hotel check-in is also an option. If you have pet(s,) be sure to determine ahead of time that you can bring them with you.

#### What to Take:

If you choose a shelter, you should consider the following: water, non-perishable food/snacks + can opener, sleeping bag/blanket & pillow, camp chair, change of clothing, pet food, all medications, first aid kit, cell phone/tablet, chargers, trash bags, hand sanitizer/wipes, mask(s,) toothbrush/paste, cash, identification/credit cards. If you have pet(s,) you will absolutely need a crate for them. Pets cannot stay with their owners, but are crated in a different room. Most of these items can be assembled and stored to be available from season to season. Early warnings provide sufficient time to load a vehicle.

If you choose a motel/hotel, you can probably pack as if for a visit or vacation. Some water and food —especially for pets—may be a good idea, along with extra seating and a first aid kit. Toiletries will be

needed, but sanitary items should be available at the location. Be sure to take medications, credit cards, ID, cash, electronic devices and chargers.

#### **To Shelter in Place:**

<u>If you choose to stay in the park,</u> be aware that our community does NOT have a safe shelter. The Clubhouse will be closed and locked; it is not a safe shelter. Your home most likely contains all you need to continue occupying it, but you should consider stocking some extras. The CDC recommends: a several day supply of non-perishable food, a gallon of water per day per person for drinking and sanitation, pet food, battery powered items like flashlights, lanterns, radios, chargers, extra cash. <u>As Always:</u> Reach out to your neighbors for help, advice, pointers, and support.

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

### Under the Little **Chestnut Moon**



Before the blight at the end of the nineteenth century, chestnut trees were plentiful throughout central and northern Florida. Producing a nut with only a trace amount of fat, low in cholesterol, high in vitamin C and protein, chestnuts were a significant food source for indigenous southern populations, hence September's moon name. Chestnut trees prefer a long, warm, growing season followed by a mild winter, which I am sure sounds familiar to all of us CenFlo residents. I've not (yet) considered planting one in my yard, but Florida's native chestnut, the Chinquapin (castanea pumila,) is alive and well.


September is a time when all of the baby critters should be on their way to independence, and the adults begin to prepare for-believe it or not-winter. For us here in LST, September means hurricane watch. Storms can develop rapidly on either side of our peninsula during this peak month of the hurricane season. Most of us will have plans in place to evacuate, if needed, along with a supply of necessities in case of lengthy power outages or water contamination. I am careful to dig out Theo's crate; in case I can't find a pet-friendly place, we can easily head to a shelter. Dog food and bottled water are at the top of my supply list; even in a petfriendly motel, those will not be easily found. For me and my human companions, peanut butter, bread, and a few utensils, along with fruits and vegs to eat out of hand, will get us to where we can feel safe. I don't keep a large cache of foodstuffs in my house. If we are without power or water for more than a day or two, I will find a motel for the duration. One item I would like to have is a portable generator that could keep my refrigerator going. Happily, I found it on Amazon!

Despite all the potential storm activity, September provides a slow, drowsy transition to cooler, drier weather. I love to feel the whispered hint of Florida winter in the breezes. It's swift: it's subtle, but it is present. Temperatures can reach ninety, but fewer and fewer days' highs will rise above that mark. Rain should continue almost daily, and typical afternoon storms still carry the threat of lightning strikes.

In the garden, it's definitely time to start replacing specimens that haven't survived the summer. My marigolds and mini roses are looking bedraggled, despite watering and feeding. My hanging basket dried up two months ago. The lavender is struggling, but should recover after a decent pruning, and the same holds for the euphorbia. The orange bird of paradise looks rough, but it has already bloomed twice for me, and I can't give up my attachment to the Oahu memories it calls back. All of my perennial flowering plants are now in pots to make it easier for me to garden, but summer's relentless sun and high dew points are hard on them. Luckily, it's Florida, and they will recover even if I have to cut them to the dirt. My two surviving plumeria were put in the ground this spring, and they love the east exposure, thriving in the heat. The mini-cado (miniature avocado) has also been put in the ground, but has not yet indicated whether it's happy. The "rescue banana" on the west side of the back yard has been saved by kind neighbors and just keeps getting bigger. With these two plants, I have a new goal: live long enough to harvest an avocado and a banana—even if I can't eat them.

#### Yard of the Month It's NOT a competition: It's a THANKS.

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### Too Hot to Cook?—of course it is!

<u>It's Salad Time:</u> Avocado to Zucchini, salads need no recipe, little prep, and minimal presentation. Try These:

- Avocado stuffed with Tuna Salad comes together with a can of tuna plus 1/3 cup of chickpeas, spiced with salt, pepper, garlic powder, smoked paprika, and za'atar, if you have it. Dress it with a yoghurt vinaigrette and pile it into halved avocados to serve.
- Bean Salad in Five Minutes uses 2 cans of cannellini beans (white beans,) rinsed and dumped in a bowl. Dress with a garlic vinaigrette and toss with ¼ cup of toasted almonds. Top with lemon zest and more almonds to serve.
- Joanna Gaines' Caprese Salad subs peaches for tomatoes and comes together in a flash. Cut 4 peaches into slices or wedges, open two packages of mozzarella balls, tear up some basil leaves and arrange all on a plate. Drizzle with balsamic vinaigrette to serve.
- Zucchini and Corn Salad calls for 1-2 small green or yellow squash, outsides peeled into long ribbons (discard the watery middles;) mix with the fresh kernels of one ear of corn and dress with a lemony vinaigrette to serve.

<u>It's Sandwich Time:</u> Arguably easier to assemble and more satisfying, bread and fillings are always a hit. Try These:

• Buffalo Chicken Wraps use ½ cup of jarred buffalo sauce and 1 diced rotisserie

- chicken (meat minus its skin) tossed with 3 tablespoons of melted butter. Warm 4 large flour tortillas and top evenly with the chicken mixture, shredded mozzarella, celery sticks, and blue cheese dressing. Fold the tortillas in and tightly roll to serve.
- Ginger Scallion Chicken Wraps offer a different flavor profile, combining the chicken with a cabbage slaw containing yellow and red bell pepper, English cucumber, and cooked shiitake mushrooms. Dress with any sesameginger dressing. Serve wrapped in tortillas.
- Smashed Chickpea Salad Sandwiches require 1 can of chickpeas, drained and rinsed, tossed in a bowl and partially smashed. Add some diced celery, any spices you like, mayonnaise and mustard (2:1,) salt, and pepper. Spread on toasted bread of your choice.
- Italian Deli Pinwheel Sandwiches use deli meats like ham, pepperoni, salami, and turkey, layered on 4 warmed flour tortillas spread with mayo and mustard. Add a layer of sliced cheese, roasted red peppers, and kale, lettuce, or arugula. Roll, chill for 15 minutes, and slice to serve.
- The Ultimate Party Sub layers the same meats onto one lengthwise half of a ciabatta loaf spread with mayo and mustard. Add cheese slices, lettuce, sliced tomatoes, sliced onions, and pepperoncini on the other side. Bring the halves together, wrap and refrigerate; slice to serve.

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
