


For a very short January reading list, I chose two books that I enjoyed very much; one was a Book Club choice, the other a Dayton Literary Peace Prize nominee.

Billy Lynn's: Long Halftime Walk

by Ben Fountain

Runner up for the Dayton (Ohio) Literary Peace Prize in 2013, this short novel tells the story of Bravo squad, a group of young soldiers between deployments in the Iraq war. They have been "recruited" for a stateside Victory Tour intended to reinvigorate support for the war by spotlighting their bravery in wartime. The novel fo-

cuses on their last appearance before their return to the Iraqi conflict. During this particular event, they will appear at Texas Stadium to be honored at halftime of a football game. The author introduces ten different characters, connecting them to various subplots that reflect the



effects of their real wartime experiences. Some of the men of Bravo Squad cannot escape these effects, while others use the tour as a chance to capitalize on their status as "heroes" and to enjoy the benefits of this status, however briefly. The focus on Billy as a main character allows the reader to share his confused and conflicting feelings about the violence and danger of the war, about redeployment, about his dysfunctional family, about people's perception of war, and about his own desires and goals. Billy's connection with Faison, a Dallas Cowboys cheerleader,

and her interest in him helps solidify his thinking, but it is not enough to save him from his emotional and moral ties to Bravo Squad. The raucous half-time show—where the men are introduced—serves as a brutal reminder of the noise and chaos of war for the Squad; although deeply shaken, Billy recovers with Faison's help. Yet, despite the possibility of love and family, guilt and loyalty force his choice to join Bravo Squad in re-deployment.

This is a sad novel in most ways. As a reader, you cannot help but be affected by the contrasting experience and situation of the returning "heroes" and those "at home" whom they represent in the war. While you wish only a happier outcome for them, you are also faced with the realization that they must return to violence, dan-


ger, and fear, and will be lucky to survive, both physically and emotionally. I think this novel is a valid representation of what it might be like to return to the US from any war, but at the same time it develops a particular character in Billy Lynn, a young man whom you like and admire. Ben Fountain's novel was made into a movie in 2016. I would also recommend *The Things They Carried* by Tim O'Brien, based on his experiences in the Vietnam War, and the non-fiction *Thank You for Your Service* by David Finkel, a collection of real-life stories of soldiers returning from combat.



Julietby Anne Fortier

This 2010 New York Times bestseller follows Julie Jacobs and her four-minutes-younger-and-not-

identical twin sister Janice who were raised by their Aunt Rose after the deaths of their parents in Italy. Their aunt was a woman of both style and substance, and the girls enjoyed a comfortable and rather privileged life, but growing into to opposed personalities. Janice is glamorous, sexy, and self confident,



always seeking the spotlight, while Julie is somber, skinny, and virginal, preferring to remain in the background. When their aunt dies at 82, Julie is devastated, but Janice seems interested only in the value of her share of the estate. Accordingly, Janice is elated when Rose's will reveals that the entire estate is hers, leaving Julie out in the cold. Julie is both angered and flabbergasted by this turn of events; she expected to inherit at least half of her aunt's home and belongings. Soon, however, Umberto, Rose's long-time butler, hands Julie an envelope containing a letter, a passport, and a key. The letter explains that Julie's real name is Giulietta Tolomei, and the key fits a safety deposit box in a bank in Siena, Italy. Along with the passport in her real name, Umberto gives Julie her marching orders: it was her aunt's last wish for Julie to go to Italy and claim the family treasure. Julie's journey across the world and into the past involves her in a confusion of superstition, revenge, and greed. As she meets other descendants of her fourteenth century namesake Giulietta and her Romeo, Julie finds herself in danger, the target of an ancient curse and blood-feud. This is an entertaining book with a bit of mystery and suspense spiced p with some romance. Its connection to the Shakespeare play *Romeo and Juliet* is clever, and the plot suits the medieval city in which it is set. As a reader, you will like Julie and root for her; her happy ending is a little predictable, but the path to it is full of surprises. I enjoyed the book although the twists and turns and near escapes did reach the edge of too much, and while I liked the happy ending, it had a lot of tying-up-looseends. However, I wouldn't let that deter you from enjoying this original mystery novel.

Once again, please reach out to me if you would like recommendations on any particular type of book. If you choose to read one of my suggestions, I would love to hear your ideas about it. 


Buck's career has been in Shipping and Receiving for large companies and now is working in Wildwood in Shipping and Receiving for a plumbing company.

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
