## Carol Roberts

For a place like LST, where family, community, and neighborliness are paramount, I'd like to offer a very lovely biography: *The Good Neigh*bor: The Life and Work of Fred Rogers by **Maxwell King.** In reviewing the book, USA Today listed surprising five things to learn about Mr. Rogers. I'd like to share those points in recommending this book.

#### Fred Rogers' parents used their wealth to help their community.

Fred Rogers' background did provide him with the leeway and wherewithal to follow his instinctive dream. As the only son of a successful Latrobe, PA, businessman and the daughter of a wealthy Pittsburgh industrialist, Fred grew up indulged and protected. His family's wealth protected not just Fred, but many of his peers, as his parents routinely provided what any individual in Latrobe might need. In his biography, King is able to re-create Fred's experiences and feelings as a child, showing how his upbringing shaped him to become a thoughtfully empathetic and sensitive man. His devotion to children and attraction to make-believe are rooted in his own childhood. Although wealthy, as an adult, Fred lived very simply and frugally, leaving behind the extravagances of his boyhood but retaining the lessons he embraced growing up.

#### Before an Oprah appearance, he said he didn't want children in the audience.

Rogers knew that if children were present, his demeanor would change. Everyone who knew

Fred Rogers remarks on his ability to see and communicate authentically with children. He just knew how to be a child again. King re-tells numerous instances when Fred Rogers became Mr. Rogers at the behest of of a child. His biography shows that Fred pursued a graduate degree in child development and spent hours and hours consulting and studying with child development experts and expert child psychologists in

order to develop each episode of his show. As an ordained Presbyterian minister, Fred embraced children as his ministry and battled with his church to legitimize his vision.



#### He often saw a psychiatrist to deal with work stress.

King's biography shows readers a man driven to perfection in his chosen mission. One story recalls a PBS station promotion early in Fred's career. Children and their parents were invited to meet Mr. Rogers about a year after his first local tv show had begun in Boston. The staff expected about 500 children. The crowd that showed up numbered more than 5000, and the line stretched from the studio past the Harvard football stadium at Soldiers' Field. Fred Rogers knelt and greeted each child separately and individually. Such dedication not only created professional stress but caused Fred to struggle for time to parent his own children. Personally, Fred was marked by his upbringing. Bullied at school and coddled at home, he developed a compulsive personality. His OCD showed in his deliberate routine; he swam nearly every morning of his life



as part of his regime to maintain a weight of 143 pounds. 143 stands for the 1 letter in "I," the four letters in "love," and the three letters in "you." His weight never varied in his adult life.

#### *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood* could have featured more music.

King's biography reveals a young Fred Rogers who left Dartmouth College to pursue a music degree at Rollins College in Florida. As a piano prodigy, Fred first fell in love with music at his mother's knee. He composed over 200 songs and nine children's operas.

### Rogers had a knack for anticipating the kinds of questions children would ask.

Fred Rogers taught himself to see through others' eyes, to anticipate their needs and insecurities, to understand their fears and joys.

King's book gives us a man who plain and simply reminds me of what it means to be human. Just like us, Fred (I know he wouldn't mind that I call him Fred) had his failures, his problems, and his struggles. He had his successes, his joys, and his triumphs. Just like us, he tried to think of others first, to provide what might be missing or needed. And just like us, he did his best.

#### **New Year's Traditions**

In many countries, New Year's celebrations begin on the evening of December 31—New



Year's Eve—and continue into the early hours of January 1. Revelers often enjoy meals and snacks thought to bestow good luck for the coming year. In Spain and several other Spanish-speaking countries, people bolt down a dozen grapes-symbolizing their hopes for the months ahead-right before midnight. In many parts of the world, traditional New Year's dishes feature legumes, which are thought to resemble coins and herald future financial success; examples include lentils in Italy and black-eyed peas in the southern United States. Because pigs represent progress and prosperity in some cultures, pork appears on the New Year's Eve table in Cuba, Austria, Hungary, Portugal and other countries. Ring-shaped cakes and pastries, a sign that the year has come full circle, round out the feast in the Netherlands, Mexico, Greece and elsewhere. In Sweden and Norway, meanwhile, rice pudding with an almond hidden inside is served on New Year's Eve; it is said that whoever finds the nut can expect 12

months of good fortune.

Other customs that are common worldwide include watching fireworks and



singing songs to welcome the new year, including the ever-popular "Auld Lang Syne" in many English-speaking countries. The practice of making resolutions for the new year is thought to have first caught on among the ancient Babylonians, who made promises in order to earn the favor of the gods and start

the year off on the right foot. (They would reportedly vow to pay off debts and return borrowed farm equipment.)

In the United States, the most iconic New



Year's tradition is the dropping of a giant ball in <u>New York</u> City's Times Square at the stroke of midnight. Millions of people around the world watch the event, which has taken place almost every year since 1907. Over time, the ball itself has ballooned from a 700-pound iron-and-wood orb to a brightly patterned sphere 12 feet in diameter and weighing in at nearly 12,000 pounds. Various towns and cities across America have developed their own versions of the Times Square ritual, organizing public drops of items ranging from pickles (Dillsburg, <u>Pennsylvania</u>) to possums (Tallapoosa, <u>Georgia</u>) at midnight on New Year's Eve.
